Prior to his appointment with the Governor's Cabinet, Secretary Morris served as the 19th president of Emory & Henry College since 1992. A distinguished Constitutional scholar and political scientist, he was a full-time faculty member at the University of Richmond for 21 years.

A native of Galax, Virginia, Secretary Morris earned a bachelor's degree in government at Virginia Military Institute, studied at Princeton University, then completed master's and doctoral degrees in government at the University of Virginia. He received fellowships for additional advanced study including a year as a Liberal Arts Fellow at the Harvard Law School and a year as a fellow of the National Endowment for the Humanities at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Widely known as an expert on state and national levels as an astute political commentator and writer, Secretary Morris served as a political analyst for television, radio and print media for more than 25 years. He is also the author or co-author of four books, including *Virginia Government and Politics: Readings and Comments*, a 1998 work he co-edited with Larry Sabato of the University of Virginia.

Secretary Morris also chaired the Commission on Virginia's State and Local Tax Structure for the 21st Century from 1999-2000 and was a member of Governor Mark Warner's Commission on Efficiency and Effectiveness in 2002.

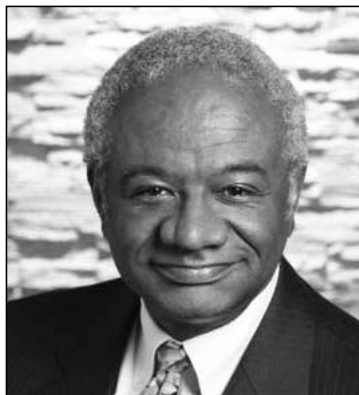

Randolph-Macon College President Robert R. Lindgren presented Professor Emerita B.J. Seymour, Ph.D., with an honorary Doctor of Humanities degree on May 13, 2009.

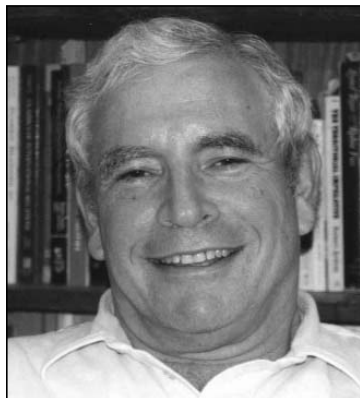
"Professor Seymour is a gifted scholar whose legacy at the college is unparalleled," said Lindgren. "She is truly a trailblazer whose life and scholarly work have inspired generations of students."

Seymour, who taught religious studies, became the first full-time female faculty member of the college in 1971. She was also the first woman at R-MC to attain tenure, chair a department and be granted the rank of full professor.

In 2004, R-MC established the annual B.J. Seymour Alumna Award, which honors alumnae who have worked on behalf of issues important to women and/or girls.

Seymour earned a bachelor's degree from Furman University, a M.R.E. from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, a master's degree from the University of Richmond and a Ph.D. from Duke University. She retired in 2003 after 32 years of service to the college.

The Bruce M. Unger Award for Retiring Faculty



Bruce M. Unger, Ph.D.

Dr. Bruce M. Unger was a political science professor at R-MC for 40 years. He was a celebrated educator and received numerous awards during his career. He planned to retire in 2008, but lost his courageous fight against cancer before his retirement was official.

The Bruce M. Unger Award was established to recognize the contributions of retiring faculty with more than ten years of service to the College. Recipients of this honor are announced below.

The Bruce M. Unger Award Recipients



Robert H.P. Baerent, Ph.D., Professor of German

Robert H.P. Baerent, Ph.D., joined the faculty at Randolph-Macon College in 1972. During his tenure he received the Walter W. Craigie Teaching Endowment, the Thomas Branch Teaching Award and the Samuel Nelson Gray Distinguished Professor Award. He also received numerous grants, and in 1995 he founded the Marburg-Randolph-Macon exchange program. In 2004 Baerent was awarded the Goethe Institut and American Association of Teachers of German Certificate of Merit for Outstanding Service to the Learning of the German Language.

Baerent and Dr. Arthur Conway were the first R-MC professors to teach an honors program course at the college. Baerent also chaired the committee on the faculty for five years and served on the strategic planning committee, the executive committee, the review board of the honor's council and the curriculum committee. Until his retirement, he served as chair of the German Department.

Baerent earned a B.A. in German history from the University of Maryland, a M.A. in German from the University of Kentucky and a Ph.D. in German from the University of Connecticut.

The Bruce M. Unger Award Recipients

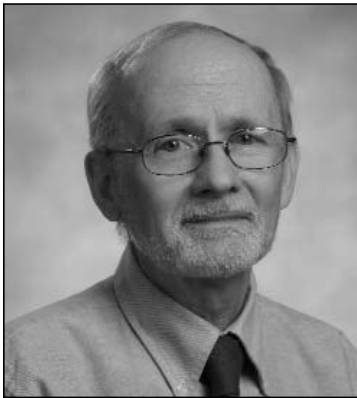


Arthur F. Conway, Ph.D., Professor of Biology

Arthur F. Conway, Ph.D., joined the faculty at Randolph-Macon College in 1979. In 1982, 1989 and 1991 he was awarded the Thomas Branch Award for Excellence in Teaching, and in 1994 he was the recipient of the Samuel Nelson Gray Distinguished Professor Award. In addition, Conway was awarded the Chenery Research Professorship in 1989-90.

During his tenure, Conway served on the executive committee of the faculty, the committee on admissions, credits and academic status of students, the retention committee and the pre-medical advisory committee. From 2001 until his retirement he served as the director of R-MC's honors program. Conway is the author of numerous publications and a member of many professional organizations, including the Sigma Xi Science Honor Society. In addition to his other courses, Conway taught several First-Year Experience colloquia while at R-MC.

Conway earned a B.S. in biology from the College of William & Mary and a Ph.D. in developmental biology from the University of Miami in Florida.



Bruce Lee King, Ph.D., Associate Professor of Biology

Bruce King, Ph.D., joined the faculty at Randolph-Macon College in 1975. While at R-MC, King served on the committee on activities and special events, the scholarship and financial aid committee and the teacher certification committee.

In 1988 and 1994 King received the Chenery Research Professorship. During his tenure he also received a Rashkind Family Foundation grant, two grants from the Walter W. Craigie Teaching Endowment, and teaching and research grants from the National Science Foundation and the Thomas F. Jeffress Foundation.

King's areas of specialty include chemosystematics and plant taxonomy, and he has published numerous research articles in peer-reviewed scientific journals. He has been a member of the Botanical Society of America, the American Society of Plant Taxonomists, the Virginia Academy of Science, Sigma Xi, the Association of Southeastern Biologists and other scientific organizations.

King earned a B.S. in biology from the University of Southern Mississippi and M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in botany from the University of Georgia.

The Academic Dress

Modern American academic dress follows a custom that preserves many of the features that originated in the Middle Ages, when cap, gown, tunic and hood were ordinary clothing for men of all ranks, inside and outside the universities. The people of the Middle Ages associated particular styles of gowns and hoods with scholars of varying degrees of prestige.

President Lindgren's black woolen gown with purple velvet chevrons and panels is the juris doctor gown of the University of Florida.

The Simpson Mace

The Simpson Mace is a symbol of academic authority at Randolph-Macon College. Dr. W. Schuyler Miller carried it for the first time on September 16, 1988, as the faculty processed to the fall convocation and dedication ceremony for the McGraw-Page Library.

Dr. and Mrs. Grellet C. Simpson presented the mace in honor of Dr. Thomas McNider Simpson, Jr., Class of 1901, a Randolph-Macon professor of mathematics and dean of the faculty, and the sixteen members of the Simpson family who attended the college between 1894 and 1984. Grellet Simpson, a member of the Randolph-Macon College Class of 1930, was a professor of English and dean of the faculty at his alma mater.

The Presidential Medallion

Susannah Wagner, a registered British silversmith of Ashland, Virginia, created the Presidential Medallion in 1998 using a silver representation of the college's seal created by the Franklin Mint. The chain and frame around the seal are silver; the oak and maple leaf insets within the chain are gold. The medallion, which symbolizes the office of the president, was a gift to the college from Mr. and Mrs. John B. Werner of Richmond, Virginia. Mr. Werner is a Trustee Emeritus and a member of the Randolph-Macon Class of 1953.

The College Seal

The official college seal depicts Randolph-Macon's first building, a four-story brick structure built in 1832, which still stands today on the school's original campus in Boydton, Virginia. Encircling this image are the words *Sigillum Collegi Randolph-Maconensis in Virginia*—"Seal of Randolph-Macon College in Virginia." The seal appears on all Randolph-Macon College diplomas and other official documents of the college.

Honors Program Medals

The medals worn by graduates of the Randolph-Macon College Honors Program consist of a pewter medal on a black ribbon. The medal has the college seal in the center and "Honors Program Graduate" in the perimeter.

The United States Flag

The United States flag located on the Commencement stage was flown over the United States Capitol on February 3, 2003, at the request of the Honorable John Warner, United States Senator, in recognition of the anniversary of the founding of Randolph-Macon College.

Randolph-Macon College

By the 1820s, clergy of the Virginia Conference of the Methodist Church had recognized a need to educate prospective clergymen in the fields of English, history and geography, so they could pass required examinations for entrance into the ministry. This growing need, coupled with the rise of more cities with more learned congregations, called for the establishment of a liberal arts college where prospective ministers could study and learn the art of communication with urban townspeople.

In 1830, the Virginia legislature approved a charter for Randolph-Macon College, which would be located in Boydton, Virginia, near the border of North Carolina. The names of John Randolph, a Virginia statesman, and Nathaniel Macon, a North Carolina statesman, were given to the college to dispel the notion that the school was to be only a sectarian one. Neither man was Methodist.

The College was moved to Ashland, Virginia, in 1868 after the railroads to Boydton were destroyed during the Civil War. The move to Ashland challenged the college's spirit and stimulated new growth. The students themselves raised most of the funds for the first major building constructed on the "new" campus – Washington and Franklin Hall, a national historic landmark that was completely renovated in 1987.

Today, Randolph-Macon College, the oldest Methodist college in continuous operation in the United States, still remains true to its mission of "developing the minds and character of its students" through a combination of personal interaction and academic rigor. The student-faculty ratio is 11:1 and the average class size is 16 students. The College has grown to more than 60 major buildings on 116 acres, offers 29 majors and has an enrollment of approximately 1,200 students.

Randolph-Macon, a selective, Phi Beta Kappa college, has an outstanding national reputation for its "Peaks of Excellence" to include internships, study abroad and undergraduate research opportunities, and also offers a wealth of social and athletic programs to its students. The College's successful First-Year Experience program partners two professors from different disciplines who then collaborate to present a two-semester colloquium to students, providing them with a cross-disciplinary view of a selected topic. January Term provides students the opportunity to concentrate on one course, study abroad or gain valuable career experience through an internship. The College is also dedicated to providing a variety of financial aid options to include scholarships, which make a Randolph-Macon College education affordable for all students.
