NBC's Tim Russert is the managing editor and moderator of *Meet the Press* and political analyst for *NBC Nightly News* and *The Today Show*. Additionally, he anchors *The Tim Russert Show*, a weekly interview program on MSNBC. He also serves as senior vice-president and Washington bureau chief of NBC News.

The award winning journalist took over the helm of *Meet the Press* in December 1991. Since then, the show has become the most watched Sunday morning interview program in America and the most quoted news program in the world. Russert's many awards include a 2005 Emmy for his role in the coverage of the funeral of President Ronald Regan; the Golden Plate Award of the Academy of Achievement; The Joan S. Barone Award, which is the highest award given by the Radio and Television Correspondents, for his *Election* 2000: *Meet the Press* interviews with George Bush and Al Gore; and the Annenberg Center's Walter Cronkite Award.

Russert is the author of two books, *Big Russ and Me* (Random House, 2004) and *Wisdom of Our Fathers* (Random House, 2006), which are highly acclaimed bestsellers.

Senior Speaker Carter Pendleton Augustine



Carter Augustine is graduating with a bachelor's degree in psychology and a minor in women's studies. She is from Richmond, Virginia, and is the daughter of Amy and Lee Bradshaw. Carter's academic and leadership abilities have been recognized throughout her collegiate education. She served as chair of the sophomore class blood drive, president of her junior class and as an orientation leader. This spring she was inducted into the psychology honor society, Psi Chi and the science honor society, Chi Beta Phi. Carter is also a member of Kappa Alpha Theta Sorority, Omicron Delta Kappa Leadership Fraternity, Gamma Sigma Alpha Greek Academic Honor Society and Order of Omega Greek Leadership Honor Society. She has been awarded the Ira Lechner Scholarship for Public Service, the Second-Year Emerging Leader Award, the Douglas W. Foard Phi Beta Kappa Sophomore Award and the Lettie Pate Whitehead Scholarship honoring Christian female students.

Carter just completed an internship with the Children's Hospital Feeding Center and plans to continue working with children following graduation.

Candidate for the Honorary Degree Doctor of Letters Charles F. Bryan, Jr., Ph.D.



Dr. Charles F. Bryan, Jr. has served as president and CEO of the Virginia Historical Society since 1988. During this time, he has overseen fundraising campaigns that have raised more than \$110 million, resulting in quadrupling the size of the VHS headquarters building and a significant expansion of educational programs statewide.

A respected consultant and speaker at museums and historical societies throughout the United States, Bryan has published extensively on the management of history museums and on the American Civil War. He co-edited the bestseller *Eye of the Storm: A Civil War Odyssey* (Free Press, 2000), and a follow-up volume, *Images from the Storm* (Free Press, 2001).

In 2006, the VHS named a new wing in honor of Dr. Bryan to recognize his long and successful service. He will retire in December 2008.

Candidate for the Honorary Degree Doctor of Laws Walter Willson Craigie



Walter W. Craigie is a senior advisor with Morgan Keegan & Company. He has served in the executive branch of the Commonwealth of Virginia as Treasurer, Secretary of Finance, and as an advisor to governors on financial and budget issues.

Craigie's relationship to R-MC goes back to his great-grandfather, a pre-Civil War graduate of the college. In 1983, his father created the Walter W. Craigie Teaching and Research Grants, which has gifted R-MC with more than \$500,000. In 2007, Craigie and his wife created the Walter and Beese Craigie Scholarship Fund through the Brown Challenge. He is a member of the R-MC Presidents Society, Heritage Society and is a trustee emeritus of the R-MC Board of Trustees since 2005.

His non-profit work includes serving as chairman of the Woodberry Forest School Board of Trustees, a school founded by his great-grandfather.

Candidate for the Honorary Degree Doctor of Letters Sue Forbes Watson




Sue Forbes Watson became the first woman appointed to the Hanover County School Board in 1976. During her more than 30 years on the board, Watson has served nine terms as vice-chair and seven terms as chair. She is the third-longest serving school board member in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

An active, lifelong leader in the community, Watson founded the Ashland Musical Variety Show in 1982 and has since served as its producer and director. This legendary event, which is held every other year, raises money for the Hanover Arts and Activities Center and brings together hundreds of volunteers from the community to dance, sing and act. Watson volunteers her time to serve on organization boards including the Ashland 150th Celebration Committee; the Virginia School Boards Association; the Metro Educational Research Consortium; and the R-MC Arts Advisory Council.

Bruce M. Unger, Ph.D.

Posthumously Retired



Political Science Professor Bruce Unger was a celebrated educator and received numerous awards during his career at R-MC. In 2002, he was awarded the prestigious Charles J. Potts Professorship, a position he held until the fall of 2007. He was awarded the student-voted Thomas Branch Award for Excellence in Teaching six times, and he received the Samuel Nelson Gray Distinguished Professor Award in 1980. He was also awarded the prestigious Outstanding Faculty Award from the Council of Higher Education of the Commonwealth of Virginia, the Exemplary Teaching Award from the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry of the United Methodist Church, and the silver medalist for the Professor of the Year Award from the Council for Advancement and Support for Higher Education.

Outside of the classroom, Dr. Unger was a recognized scholar throughout the world. His areas of specialization included Soviet/American relations; U.S./Soviet military balance; Indian Ocean/Persian Gulf area world affairs; voting behavior; American foreign policy; defense policy and international relations. In 1992, he was a participant in the Earth Summit held in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. He also attended professional conferences in Moscow, Belarus, Japan and South Africa. Locally, he was a regular speaker at schools, churches and civic groups on international and environmental issues. Several of his articles were published nationally and internationally in newspapers, magazines and electronic journals.

Dr. Unger earned his bachelor's degree in political science in 1964 from Queens College and completed his master's and Ph.D. degrees from Tulane University in 1967 and 1973 respectively. He was awarded memberships in the national honorary societies of Pi Sigma Alpha, Pi Gamma Mu, Tau Kappa Alpha and Omicron Delta Kappa.

The Bruce M. Unger Award for Retiring Faculty

Dr. Unger had planned to retire from R-MC in 2008 after 40 years of service to the college. In his honor, President Lindgren announced the establishment of the Bruce M. Unger Award for Retiring Faculty. The Unger Award recognizes the contributions of retiring faculty with more than ten years of service to the college. 
The Bruce M. Unger Award Recipients



Brenda G. Gilman, Ph.D., Associate Professor of Education

Brenda Gilman, Ph.D., became the assistant director of the counseling and career center at Randolph-Macon College in 1983. In 1989, she became a full-time faculty member in the education department and two years later was named director of the elementary education teacher preparation program. She wrote the curriculum and hired the teachers for the program, which has since become a model for other institutions.

Dr. Gilman brought 14 years of elementary classroom teaching experience in kindergarten and grades first, third, sixth, and seventh to Randolph-Macon's education department. She was the first recipient of Hanover County Public Schools' Teacher of the Year award. She earned a bachelor's degree in home economics education from Longwood College, a master's of education degree in guidance and counseling as well as a Ph.D. in urban services from Virginia Commonwealth University.



C. Barry Knisley, Ph.D., The Paul H. Wornom, M.D., Professor in Biological Sciences

C. Barry Knisley, Ph.D., joined the faculty of Randolph-Macon College in 1979. He was awarded the Paul H. Wornom, M.D., Professorship in Biological Sciences in 2000 and was instrumental in starting the research requirement component for all biology majors.

Dr. Knisley earned a B.A. in zoology at Pennsylvania State University and his M.S. and Ph.D. in entomology at Rutgers University. He is a world authority on tiger beetles and their conservation, and has conducted the research leading to five species being placed on the Endangered Species list. Dr. Knisley has published 50 research articles, many co-authored with students, and published four books, the most recent in 2006, A Field Guide to the Tiger Beetles of the United States and Canada: Identification, Natural History and Distribution of the Cicindelidae.



William W. Reinhardt, Ph.D., Professor of History

William W. Reinhardt, Ph.D., joined the faculty of Randolph-Macon College in September 1967. He served as chair of the History Department from 1987 to 1999. In the past 41 years, he is proud to say he has taught more than 5,000 students. Dr. Reinhardt earned his B.A., M.A. and Ph.D. at Duke University. As a Fulbright Scholar in 1974, he conducted research on provincial legislatures in India. Dr. Reinhardt looks back on his career at Randolph-Macon with a sense of accomplishment and gratitude for all the good friends he has made in the college community. He looks forward to "living happily ever after" in retirement.



Ritchie D. Watson, Jr., Ph.D., The A. G. Ingram Professor in English

Ritchie Watson, Ph.D., joined the faculty of Randolph-Macon College in 1970. In 1998, he was awarded the A. G. Ingram Professorship in English. Additional honors include the Samuel Nelson Gray Distinguished Professor Award in 1992, the United Methodist Church Exemplary Teaching Award in 1993 and the student-selected Thomas Branch Award for Excellence in Teaching in 1986 and 1992. One of his most exciting teaching opportunities was traveling to the former Yugoslavia in 1989 as a Fulbright Scholar to teach American literature at Edvard Kardelj University of Ljubljana, Slovenia.

Dr. Watson earned his B.A., M.A. and Ph.D. in English from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He is the author of three books, most recently *Normans & Saxons: Southern Race Mythology and the Intellectual History of the American Civil War* (April 2008).

The Academic Dress

Modern American academic dress follows a custom that preserves many of the features that originated in the Middle Ages, when cap, gown, tunic and hood were ordinary clothing for men of all ranks, inside and outside the universities. The people of the Middle Ages associated particular styles of gowns and hoods with scholars of varying degrees of prestige.

President Lindgren's black woolen gown with purple velvet chevrons and panels is the juris doctor gown of the University of Florida.

The Simpson Mace

The Simpson Mace is a symbol of academic authority at Randolph-Macon College. Dr. W. Schuyler Miller carried it for the first time on September 16, 1988, as the faculty processed to the fall convocation and dedication ceremony for the McGraw-Page Library.

Dr. and Mrs. Grellet C. Simpson presented the mace in honor of Dr. Thomas McNider Simpson, Jr., Class of 1901, a Randolph-Macon professor of mathematics and dean of the faculty, and the sixteen members of the Simpson family who attended the college between 1894 and 1984. Grellet Simpson, a member of the Randolph-Macon College Class of 1930, was a professor of English and dean of the faculty at his alma mater.

The Presidential Medallion

Susannah Wagner, a registered British silversmith of Ashland, Virginia, created the Presidential Medallion in 1998 using a silver representation of the college's seal created by the Franklin Mint. The chain and frame around the seal are silver; the oak and maple leaf insets within the chain are gold. The medallion, which symbolizes the office of the president, was a gift to the college from Mr. and Mrs. John B. Werner of Richmond, Virginia. Mr. Werner is a member of the Randolph-Macon Class of 1953.

The College Seal

The official college seal depicts Randolph-Macon's first building, a four-story brick structure built in 1832, which still stands today on the school's original campus in Boydton, Virginia. Encircling this image are the words *Sigillum Collegi Randolph-Maconensis in Virginia*—"Seal of Randolph-Macon College in Virginia." The seal appears on all Randolph-Macon College diplomas and other official documents of the college.

Honors Program Medals

The medals worn by graduates of the Randolph-Macon College Honors Program consist of a pewter medal on a black ribbon. The medal has the college seal in the center and "Honors Program Graduate" in the perimeter.

The United States Flag

The United States flag located on the Commencement stage was flown over the United States Capitol on February 3, 2003, at the request of the Honorable John Warner, United States Senator, in recognition of the anniversary of the founding of Randolph-Macon College.

Randolph-Macon College

By the 1820s, clergy of the Virginia Conference of the Methodist Church had recognized a need to educate prospective clergymen in the fields of English, history and geography, so they could pass required examinations for entrance into the ministry. This growing need, coupled with the rise of more cities with more learned congregations, called for the establishment of a liberal arts college where prospective ministers could study and learn the art of communication with urban townspeople.

In 1830, the Virginia legislature approved a charter for Randolph-Macon College, which would be located in Boydton, Virginia, near the border of North Carolina. The names of John Randolph, a Virginia statesman, and Nathaniel Macon, a North Carolina statesman, were given to the college to dispel the notion that the school was to be only a sectarian one. Neither man was Methodist.

The college was moved to Ashland, Virginia, in 1868 after the railroads to Boydton were destroyed during the Civil War. The move to Ashland challenged the college's spirit and stimulated new growth. The students themselves raised most of the funds for the first major building constructed on the "new" campus – Washington and Franklin Hall, a national historic landmark that was completely renovated in 1987.

Today, Randolph-Macon College, the oldest Methodist college in continuous operation in the United States, still remains true to its mission of "developing the minds and character of its students" through a combination of personal interaction and academic rigor. The student-faculty ratio is 11:1 and the average class size is 16 students. The college has grown to more than 60 major buildings on 116 acres, offers 29 majors and has an enrollment of more than 1,100 students.

Randolph-Macon, a Phi Beta Kappa college, has an outstanding national reputation for its "Peaks of Excellence" to include internships, study abroad and undergraduate research opportunities, and also offers a wealth of social and athletic programs to its students. The college's successful First-Year Experience program partners two professors from different disciplines who then collaborate to present a two-semester colloquium to students, providing them with a cross disciplinary view of a selected topic. January term provides students the opportunity to concentrate on one course, study abroad or gain valuable career experience through an internship. The college also is dedicated to providing a variety of financial aid options to include scholarships, which make a Randolph-Macon College education affordable for all students.
