Commencement Speaker and Candidate for the Honorary Degree Doctor of Humane Letters Katie Couric, B.A.



In 2006, Katie Couric became the first solo female anchor of a national nightly news broadcast when she signed on as anchor and managing editor of *CBS Evening News with Katie Couric*. Prior to CBS News, Couric served for 15 years as co-anchor of NBC News' *Today*. An award-winning journalist and the host of *Katie*, a daily syndicated daytime talk show, Couric is also a special correspondent for ABC News and a contributor to *ABC World News, Nightline*, 20/20, Good Morning America, This Week and primetime news specials.

Couric has covered the most important news stories around the world during her career and received numerous awards for her interviewing and reporting skills, including the Edward R. Murrow Award for Best Newscast and the Walter Cronkite Award for Special Achievement.

After losing her husband, Jay Monahan, to colon cancer in 1998, Couric became a public leader in the fight against the country's second-largest cancer killer. Her advocacy has led to the creation of the National Colorectal Cancer Research Alliance, which she co-founded with the Entertainment Industry Foundation and cancer activist Lilly Tartikoff. She is also a co-founder of The Jay Monahan Center for Gastrointestinal Health at New York-Presbyterian Hospital/Weill Cornell Medical Center. In addition, she has helped raise nearly \$200 million as a co-founder of Stand Up To Cancer, an organization that provides funds to accelerate research that provides new therapies to patients.

An Arlington, Virginia native, Couric graduated, with honors, from the University of Virginia with a bachelor's degree in English and a focus on American Studies. She is the author of the *New York Times* bestseller *The Best Advice I Ever Got: Lessons from Extraordinary Lives* (Random House, 2011) and the co-author of two children's books.

After graduation, Jessie plans to move to Richmond, and work as a certified nursing assistant. She will also attend nursing school to become a nurse practitioner.





Candidate for the Honorary Degree Doctor of Laws Robert B. Lambeth, Jr. '71, J.D.



Attorney Robert B. Lambeth Jr. '71 Lambeth is a proud alumnus of Randolph-Macon College. He is a member of the Society of Alumni, Board of Associates and served as chairman of his reunion class. Lambeth earned his B.A. in political science from Randolph-Macon College, studied at Wroxton College, and earned his J.D. from the T.C. Williams School of Law at the University of Richmond. He has also done graduate work in government and foreign affairs at the University of Virginia.

Since 1983 Lambeth has served as president of the Council for Independent Colleges in Virginia (CICV), overseeing the coordination of projects for member institutions, including government relations, marketing, and business and purchasing activities. He is a staunch advocate for the Virginia Tuition Assistance Grant (TAG), which provides more than \$60 million per year to students attending Virginia's independent colleges. In 2010, CICV formally launched the Healthcare Consortium of the Council of Independent Colleges in Virginia, a self-insured health benefits program for 13 members of CICV.

Prior to his work at CICV, Lambeth was director of the Corporation for Jefferson's Poplar Forest. He was instrumental in forming the Corporation in 1983 to save the historical retreat of former U.S. President Thomas Jefferson. He remains on the Board of Directors, along with his wife, Lynn, who is the past president of the Corporation.

Candidate for the Honorary Degree Doctor of Humane Letters Roger H. Martin, Ph.D.



Roger H. Martin, Ph.D. served as the 14th president of Randolph-Macon College (1997–2006). He is currently president of Academic Collaborations, Inc., a higher education consulting firm, and is deputy chair of the British Schools and Universities Foundation in New York City.

During his leadership at Randolph-Macon, Martin led the final stages of a successful fundraising campaign for capital projects and endowment, which exceeded its \$41.5 million goal a year earlier than expected. The college's Welcome Center was established under his direction, and many campus facilities, including Old Chapel, Blackwell Auditorium, Cobb Theatre, Thomas Branch Hall and Jones Residence Hall, were renovated during his tenure. Martin also helped forge vital relationships between the college and the Town of Ashland and metro Richmond communities.

Prior to his service at Randolph-Macon, Martin was president of Moravian College; associate dean of the Divinity School and lecturer in church history at Harvard University; executive assistant to the president and assistant professor of history at Middlebury College; development officer at New York University; and an assistant director of external affairs and assistant professor of history at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute.

A British historian and scholar of Methodism's founder, John Wesley, Martin has taught courses on the evolution of Protestant denominationalism in Great Britain and the Methodist revival in England in the 18th and 19th centuries.

Martin earned his B.A. from Drew University after studying for one year at Edinburgh University, his bachelor of divinity and master of sacred theology degrees from Yale University, and his Ph.D. from Oxford University. He is the author of two books including *Racing Odysseus: A College President Becomes a Freshman Again* (University of California Press, 2008).

The Academic Dress

Modern American academic dress follows a custom that preserves many of the features that originated in the Middle Ages, when cap, gown, tunic and hood were ordinary clothing for men of all ranks, inside and outside the universities. The people of the Middle Ages associated particular styles of gowns and hoods with scholars of varying degrees of prestige.

President Lindgren's black woolen gown with purple velvet chevrons and panels is the Juris Doctor gown of the University of Florida.

The Simpson Mace

The Simpson Mace is a symbol of academic authority at Randolph-Macon College. Dr. W. Schuyler Miller carried it for the first time on September 16, 1988, as the faculty processed to the fall convocation and dedication ceremony for the McGraw-Page Library.

Dr. and Mrs. Grellet C. Simpson presented the mace in honor of Dr. Thomas McNider Simpson, Jr., Class of 1901, a Randolph-Macon Professor of Mathematics and Dean of the Faculty, and the sixteen members of the Simpson family who attended the college between 1894 and 1984. Grellet Simpson, a member of the Randolph-Macon College Class of 1930, was a Professor of English and Dean of the Faculty at his alma mater.

The Presidential Medallion

Susannah Wagner, a registered British silversmith of Ashland, Virginia, created the Presidential Medallion in 1998 using a silver representation of the College's seal created by the Franklin Mint. The chain and frame around the seal are silver; the oak and maple leaf insets within the chain are gold. The medallion, which symbolizes the Office of the President, was a gift to the College from Dr. and Mrs. John B. Werner of Richmond, Virginia. Dr. Werner is a Trustee Emeritus and a member of the Randolph-Macon Class of 1953.

The College Seal

The official College seal depicts Randolph-Macon's first building, a four-story brick structure built in 1832, which still stands today on the school's original campus in Boydton, Virginia. Encircling this image are the words *Sigillum Collegi Randolph-Maconensis in Virginia—*"Seal of Randolph-Macon College in Virginia." The seal appears on all Randolph-Macon College diplomas and other official documents of the College.

Honors Program Medals

The medals worn by graduates of the Randolph-Macon College Honors Program consist of a pewter medal on a black ribbon. The medal has the College seal in the center and the words "Honors Program Graduate" in the perimeter.

The United States Flag

The United States flag located on the Commencement stage was flown over the United States Capitol on February 3, 2003, at the request of the Honorable John Warner, United States Senator, in recognition of the anniversary of the founding of Randolph-Macon College.

Randolph-Macon College

By the 1820s, clergy of the Virginia Conference of the Methodist Church had recognized a need to educate prospective clergymen in the fields of English, history and geography, so they could pass required examinations for entrance into the ministry. This growing need, coupled with the rise of more cities with more learned congregations, called for the establishment of a liberal arts college where prospective ministers could study and learn the art of communication with urban townspeople.

In 1830, the Virginia legislature approved a charter for Randolph-Macon College, which would be located in Boydton, Virginia, near the border of North Carolina. The names of John Randolph, a Virginia statesman, and Nathaniel Macon, a North Carolina statesman, were given to the College to dispel the notion that the school was to be only a sectarian one. Neither man was Methodist.

The College was moved to Ashland, Virginia, in 1868 after the railroads to Boydton were destroyed during the Civil War. The move to Ashland challenged the College's spirit and stimulated new growth. The students themselves raised most of the funds for the first major building constructed on the "new" campus – Washington and Franklin Hall, a national historic landmark that was completely renovated in 1987.

Today, Randolph-Macon is the oldest Methodist-related college in continuous operation in the United States. It remains true to its mission of developing the minds and character of its students through a combination of personal interaction with faculty who challenge students to maximize their potential, and by offering a rigorous curriculum. These unique "moments of connection" prepare students for graduate studies, and a lifetime of changing careers and success in the real world. The *EDGE* career preparation program, within the Center for Personal and Career Development, helps students lead the pack when competing for jobs and top graduate schools. The student-faculty ratio is 11:1 and the average class size is 16 students. The College has grown to more than 60 major buildings on 116 acres, offers 33 majors and has an enrollment of approximately 1,300 students.

Randolph-Macon, a selective, liberal arts college, has an outstanding national reputation for its exceptional faculty, national and international internships, and study abroad and undergraduate research programs. The College's distinctive First-Year Experience program partners two professors from different disciplines who collaborate to present a two-semester colloquium to students, providing them with a cross-disciplinary view of a selected topic. January Term gives students the opportunity to concentrate on one course, study abroad or gain valuable career experience through an internship. The College also has numerous financial aid options available for students and their families, to include scholarships, which make a Randolph-Macon College education affordable.

Randolph-Macon is a proud member of the NCAA Division III and the Old Dominion Athletic Conference, and it sponsors 17 intercollegiate sports. Many of its teams and students are nationally ranked and have won national championships. The College also maintains a healthy Greek Life system and provides dozens of student organizations from which to choose. Most students are actively engaged in community service and outreach programs. R-MC students have raised thousands of dollars for community organizations.

Recently, Randolph-Macon College's Phi Beta Kappa Chapter received the organization's Triennial award for the most outstanding chapter at a liberal arts college in the United States.
