



LSAT Information

The LSAT (Law School Admission Test) is an integral part of the law school admission process in a growing number of other countries. It provides a standard measure of acquired reading and verbal reasoning skills that law schools can use as one of several factors in assessing applicants.

LSAT Sections and Times

Logical Reasoning (2)	Assess the ability to analyze, critically evaluate, and complete arguments	24-26 questions	35 min. each
Reading Comprehension (1)	Measure the ability to read, with understanding and insight	26-28 questions	35 min.
Analytical Reasoning (1)	Measure the ability to understand a structure of relationships and to draw logical conclusions	22-24 questions	35 min.
Experimental	LR, RC, or AR	22-28 questions	35 min.
Writing Sample	Must make a choice between two positions or courses of action	1 essay	35 min.

Score Range and Averages

LSAT: scored between 120-180

Average Score: around 150

Writing Sample is **not** included in your final score, but copies of your writing sample are sent to **all** law schools to which you apply.

Retakes

You may not take the LSAT more than three times in any two-year period.
